#### ABOUT THE CONFERENCE

The Victoria University, Faculty of Law will host the Conference *Recalibrating Behaviour: Smarter Regulation in a Global World* on the 23rd -24th April 2013.

This conference aims to advance the dialogue on regulatory reform in New Zealand using the research of the New Zealand Law Foundation's Regulatory Reform Project. That project started in 2010, led by Professor Susy Frankel, and comprises a multidisciplinary team of researchers from the Victoria University Faculty of Law, New Zealand Institute of Economic Research and Chapman Tripp. The project is the second largest research project the Law Foundation has funded to date.

The catalyst for the project was the theme that smarter regulatory processes and ultimately better regulation should result in both economic and social benefits for New Zealanders.

The first stages of the project analysed a variety of topics including: regulatory certainty and its counterpart discretion; legitimacy and the rule of law; property rights: the policy and processes of regulation; various areas of sector specific regulation; trade and investment; and the trans-Tasman relationship. In 2011 the book *Learning from the Past; Adapting for the Future: Regulatory Reform in New Zealand* was published which gave detailed discussion about these topics. Subsequently the research has developed these themes, resulting in the book, *Recalibrating Behaviour: Smarter Regulation in a Global World*, which will be launched at this conference. That book covers an analysis of: Regulation and Global Connectedness; the Public Voice and Consumer Behaviour; the Careful Art of Reducing Uncertain Outcomes; and the Institutions of the Regulatory Regime. The conference aims to discuss this research and further cross-cutting themes drawn from the interdisciplinary research of the project, including:

- Features of the Uniqueness of New Zealand and their Role in Regulation
- Voyage of Discovery: How do we bring Analytical Techniques to State Driven Behaviour Change?
- Learning the Way Forward? The Role of Monitoring, Evaluation and Review
- Experimentation and Regulation
- Certainty and Discretion

The conference will also demonstrate and seek feedback on the project's Toolkit, developed from the project's research.



#### ABOUT THE KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

### **Fiona Haines**

Fiona Haines (BA (Hons), PhD) is a Professor in the School of Social and Political Sciences at the University of Melbourne. She teaches in the area of corporate and white collar crime, regulation and compliance as well as the sociology of crime and deviance. Professor Haine's published works include *The Paradox of Regulation* (Edward Elgar 2011), *Globalization and Regulatory Character* (Ashgate, 2005) and *Corporate Regulation: Beyond Punish or Persuade* (Oxford, Clarendon Press, 1997). Her research encompasses a diverse range of corporate harms, disparate regulatory regimes and regulatory contexts: from workplace safety, product safety (including product liability insurance), corporate collapse, industrial disasters to anti-competitive conduct and electricity markets. Her current work extends into the tensions between regulatory regimes, the regulation of finance and insurance and the emerging area of security regulation at seaports, airports and major hazard facilities.

Professor Haines has advised government in the area of regulation and regulatory policies. She has worked with a range of government agencies including: Department of Justice (Victoria) Civil Law Policy, Primary Industries and Resources (South Australia) (PIRSA), National Road and Transport Commission and the Victorian Taxi Directorate. As a result of her research and consultancy work, she is called on to address government and professional conferences and seminars in a wide range of areas, most recently for the Victorian Law Reform Commission and the Victorian Human Rights and Equal Opportunities Commission. Professor Haines co-edited the international journal Law & Policy from 2006-2012 with Professors Nancy Reichman (University of Denver) and Colin Scott (University College Dublin). She has served on the editorial boards of Law and Society Review and is currently on the board of Regulation and Governance.

### Jonathan B Wiener

Jonathan B. Wiener is the William R. and Thomas L. Perkins Professor of Law at Duke Law School, Professor of Environmental Policy at the Nicholas School of the Environment, and Professor of Public Policy at the Sanford School of Public Policy, all at Duke University. He is also a University Fellow at Resources for the Future (RFF). In 2008, he served as President of the Society for Risk Analysis (SRA); in July 2012, he co-chaired the SRA's World Congress on Risk, held in Sydney Australia.

Professor Wiener's books include *The Reality of Precaution: Comparing Risk Regulation in the United States and Europe* (RFF Press/Routledge 2011, with others); *Reconstructing Climate Policy* (AEI Press 2003, with Richard B. Stewart); and *Risk vs. Risk: Tradeoffs in Protecting Health and the Environment* (Harvard University Press 1995, with John D. Graham). Before going to Duke in 1994, he worked in the US government at the White House Council of Economic Advisers, the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy, and the US Department of Justice. He helped negotiate the Framework Convention on Climate Change, and in 1992 he attended the Rio Earth Summit. In 1993 he helped draft Executive Order 12866 on Regulatory Review. In 1987-89, he was a law clerk to federal judges Stephen Breyer and Jack Weinstein. He received degrees in law (1987) and economics (1984) from Harvard University.
