The Time of Anne Kennedy

We are delighted to have **Anne Kennedy** in Pōneke as the Victoria University of Wellington Creative New Zealand Writer in Residence. Kennedy's work spans genre and time in ways that seem unique in our literature. Her first book, the experimental novel *100 Traditional Smiles*, was published in 1989 and since then she has continued to deny easy categorisation, writing film, award-winning poetry, and fiction that time-travels from the 12th-century mystic Hildegard of Bingen, to a five-week power blackout in 1990s Auckland and almost everywhere in between. Join **Pip Adam** in a discussion about the times Kennedy writes in and about, and how different genres require a writer to use time in different ways.

Patricia Grace: A Life's Work

Patricia Grace is an Arts Foundation Icon who has won many national and international awards for her fiction, including the Neustadt International Prize for Literature (widely considered the most prestigious literary prize after the Nobel). Grace is of Ngāti Toa, Ngāti Raukawa and Te Ati Awa descent, and is affiliated to Ngāti Porou by marriage. Her recent novel *Chappy* was a finalist in the Ockham New Zealand Book Awards. Join award-winning writer Briar Grace-Smith for a look into the career of this deeply subtle, moving and subversive writer.

A Poetry Quartet: Bill Nelson, Claire Orchard, Hera Lindsay Bird, Lynley Edmeades

Poetry in Aotearoa is fighting fit and full of life. Bill Nelson's Memorandum of Understanding, Claire Orchard's Cold water cure, Lynley Edmeades' As the Verb Tenses and Hera Lindsay Bird by Hera Lindsay Bird are diverse and exciting first books of poetry. Each writer engages with language in innovative ways to explore and reimagine history, commerce, science, love and the things people do. Come and hear the latest in poetry, in a reading and discussion chaired by poet Chris Price.

New Zealand Stories: Sue Orr and Tracey Slaughter

Sue Orr's vividly drawn novel of a 1970s farming community *The Party Line* and **Tracey Slaughter's** powerful stories of contemporary lives in *Deleted Scenes for Lovers* offer portraits from different eras in Aotearoa. Orr has a background in journalism and has previously published two award-winning short-story collections, *Etiquette for a Dinner Party* and *From Under the Overcoat*. Slaughter's short fiction has received numerous awards including the Bridport Prize 2014 and BNZ Katherine Mansfield Awards in 2001 and 2004. She lives in Cambridge and teaches Creative Writing at Waikato University, where she edits the online literary journal *Mayhem*. Writer and IIML Director **Damien Wilkins** chairs this conversation about what it is to 'write New Zealand stories'.

8 AUGUST

The Playmakers: Nina Nawalowalo & Victor Rodger

Two of the country's most exciting and accomplished theatre makers join **Ken Duncum** to discuss their careers to date and forthcoming work. Nina Nawalowalo is a Wellington theatre director with a reputation for making memorable pieces of theatre that reflect her Fijian whakapapa and European theatre training. Her work Marama premiered in the Auckland Arts Festival this year, where it was described by reviewer Raewyn Whyte as 'memorably climactic' and 'heartstopping'. Victor Rodger produces plays that explore and challenge racial and cultural stereotypes, and are grounded by vivid characterisation and complex relationships. As Metro reviewer Simon Wilson wrote, 'he knows how to write funny, and he knows how to write on the edge'. Rodger's Black Faggot has toured nationally and internationally, and won awards in both Auckland and Melbourne.

Jenny Bornholdt: from Accidental Poet to Selected Poems

In an interview on *Poetry Box*, poet **Jenny Bornholdt** said, 'I didn't grow up wanting to be a writer, so I was quite surprised when I found myself writing poems'. Bornholdt began writing seriously in 1984 and has since published many books of critically-acclaimed and popular poetry, as well as being both an Arts Foundation Laureate and a New Zealand Poet Laureate. Join us as Bornholdt and poet **James Brown** talk about her career from accidental poet to her new *Selected Poems*, published this year by Victoria University Press.

While living in London she won many new readers with her blog *Eyelash Roaming* where she writes about memory, mental health, cycling, and 'inconsequential things that wouldn't fit anywhere else'. Ashleigh is also the author of the poetry collection *Magnificent Moon* and works at Victoria University Press as an editor. She is joined by writer **Kirsten McDougall** to discuss the craft of the personal essay and ways of writing about real events.


