Water on Tap

Most New Zealanders take a ready supply of fresh running water for granted and, during a very wet spring, any thoughts of summer droughts are banished to the recesses of the mind. However, the 7.1 magnitude earthquake which rocked Christchurch in September has jolted the complacency of many New Zealanders when, suddenly, some of that city's residents lost access to water. People are reconsidering their attitude to water supply as, in the event of a major disaster, some pundits suggest that it could take up to two years to restore systems fully. The installation of residential water storage tanks, however, would provide a simple, cost-effective means of addressing the need for emergency water storage.

There are also other benefits. The collection of water run-off from roofs would alleviate pressure on the storm water system, thereby reducing the flow into harbours and streams, a contributing factor to the deterioration of our marine environment. And the flooding of streets during torrential downpours would be a less common sight. Households would have a greater appreciation of their water consumption, especially those containing gardening enthusiasts who insist on watering their lawns in the height of summer or car fanatics whose greatest weekend entertainment is restoring their pride and joy to a pristine condition.

Although we are not in the same position as many areas of Australia where not only potable water is collected but also grey water, there are areas of New Zealand which do suffer from drought. In March 2010 the Far North was in the throes of its worst drought in 60 years. Kaitaia's water supplies were at such a critical level that fines of \$20,000 were implemented for those who flouted water restrictions.

There have frequently been water restrictions on the Kapiti Coast in the last decade. As a result, the Kapiti Coast District Council is making water tanks mandatory on new houses and has committed financial incentives for water services such as tanks. Waitakere City Council also subsidises rain water tanks. With Wellington relying on the Hutt River flow which at times has fallen below the lower limits for safety of supply, surely the Greater Wellington Regional Council should be considering similar proposals? But, although the Council has identified water as a key issue in its ten year plan and is developing a regional water strategy, it recently rejected a proposal for a loan scheme to encourage households to install rain water tanks. Wellington is constantly touted as a major contender for "the big one". A simple measure of encouraging people to install tanks would ensure that water, this most basic of essentials, would always be on tap.
